Years after the devastation that killed her parents, scarred her sister, and destroyed her city, Addison takes a job from an eccentric collector that forces her to break her own rules of survival.

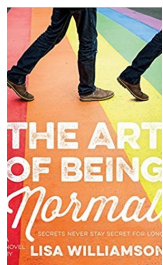


The Art of Being Normal

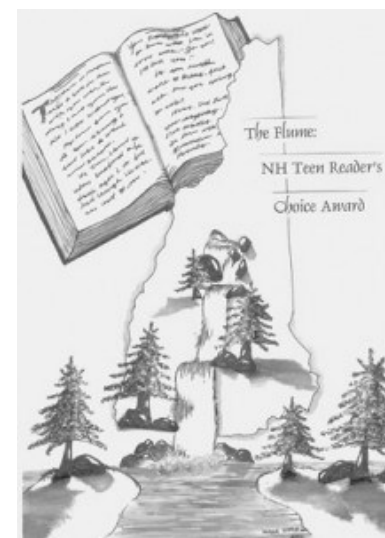

The Flume Award promotes teen reading by inviting teens to help select great literature.

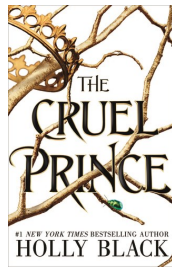
Each year, 9th - 12th graders across NH nominate their favorite books and vote on the top 10 in April.

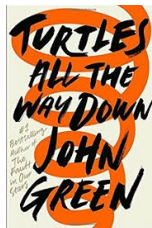


Turtles All the Way Down

Aza Holmes, a high school student with obsessive-compulsive disorder, becomes focused on searching for a fugitive billionaire.

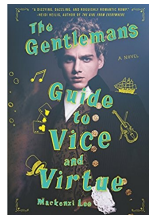


The Gentleman's Guide to Vice and Virtue

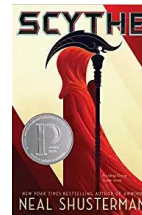


Scythe

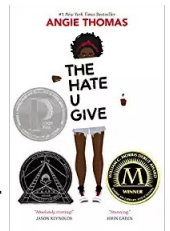


The Hate U Give

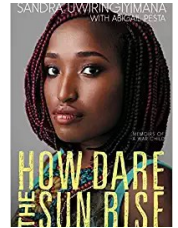


How Dare the Sun Rise
